TEACHING EXPERIENCE

COURSES AT UNC-GREENSBORO (2018–2019)

Major American Authors: Survey of American literature from 1900–present from a diverse range of authors and genres. Early African American Literature: Course examines selected literature by African Americans from 1746–1920. Later African American Literature: Course examines selected literature by African Americans from 1920–present.

COURSES AT CAROLINA FRIENDS SCHOOL (2017–2018)

- Senior Seminar: Gothic Literature and Society: Two trimester course considers Gothic conventions and their relationship to society and culture from its eighteenth-century Britain origins to more recent texts from the Caribbean and United States.
- American Literature: Year-long course traces and questions what it means to be American through novels, short stories, essays, poems, and plays from the late nineteenth century to the present.
- Global Literature: Year-long course centers on the theme "The Dance of Conformity and Non-Conformity" and explores diverse cultural perspectives on everyday life, divinity and mortality, and complexities and effects of revolutionary thoughts, movements, and actions.
